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GATTON: Remote but not so far away

Despite Gatton being 160 km away, it need not seem so far with the newly upgraded "broadband" network.

A microwave antenna mounted at Gatton campus in June (pictured right) marks a major milestone in the \$500,000 project to upgrade communications between Gatton and St Lucia campuses.

The upgrade allows full motion video transmission between Gatton and St Lucia for teaching purposes such as videoconferencing and the CVRS.

As well, it allows for increased capacity for data networking (up to 16 times faster) and better integration of the University's telephone network.

The project is being coordinated jointly by the Prentice Centre and the Property and Facilities section.

Technical Details:

The microwave radio equipment will increase the available network capacity from 2 Megabits per second to 34 Megabits per second.

The ATM switching equipment will allow the integration of data traffic, voice calls, video and multimedia connections onto one broadband link.

Similar installations are taking place at St. Lucia. The project also involves the installation of microwave repeater stations at the Canossa hospital in Oxley and the QFM transmitter on top of the "Knobby" near Laidley.

Upgrade to Desktop Video Non Linear Editing

In an earlier Bulletin we advised you VideoVision was upgrading from the tape based betacam system to a digital format. **The Avid Media Composer 900 is installed and in production.**

Staff now use desktop digital editing. In some cases, editing will be faster, but mainly more flexible. More titles, graphics, and "slicker looks" are possible. VideoVision is now using **Professional SVHS** as the collection media which means cheaper tapes and maintenance — **lower production costs but still good quality.** Improved integration and more portability means multiple camera recordings on location will be cheaper for departments.

Projects in Progress

We often say VideoVision produces videos for teaching, research and marketing... *Such as?* VideoVision are creating videos for several UQ departments. For example, we are making a video on **forensic field recovery techniques for Anatomical Sciences.** With **Social Work** we are making **exercise videos for people over 60**, as well as one on **Questioning Styles for Counselling.**

Fix for Prank Virus Available

A fix is available for the Prank virus found on some UQ computers. It affects Word 6, where "Save As" cannot be chosen, except as a template in the template directory.

Check to see if your Word files have been infected by going to the Tools menu in Word and choosing Macro. If you have macros listed starting with AAA then you have the Prank virus.

The virus loads by running a macro embedded in an infected Word 6 file. Word for Windows 2.x files are safe. There are fixes for both Windows and Mac versions of Word. They are at these Web sites, ready to download:

Mac Word: <ftp://ftp.uq.edu.au/pub/mac/wvfix.hqx>

Once you have run the fix you have to open any affected files, copy and paste them into a new file, then resave them. It is not possible to stop the files that are already infected from wanting to "Save As" a template.

Instructions for Windows

1. Download the wd1215.exe file into a temporary directory and run it. The files readme.doc, scanprot.dot & wd1215.doc will be extracted from the archive.
2. Read the ".doc" files for information about the virus.
3. From Word 6.0 for Windows, open the template file scanprot.dot and answer "yes" to all the questions. This will scan your existing normal.dot template for the virus, and load protection against future infection. You can also choose to scan other document and template files.

Instructions for Macintosh

1. Download the binhexed file wvfix.hqx via Netscape or Fetch. This decodes to a self-extracting archive wvfix.doc.sea.
2. Open the "sea" file from Finder. This will extract the Word file wvfix.doc.
3. Open the document. This will start a macro to scan for, and protect against the Prank virus.

Upgraded/Paying Clients
