Safety information

Installation

The construction of the IBM Personal Computer provides extra protection against the risk of electrical shock. The IBM PC has a power cord with a three-prong plug that is required to ground metal parts. It is the responsibility of the person installing the computer to connect it to a properly grounded electrical outlet. Seek professional assistance before using an adapter or extension cord; these devices could interrupt the grounding circuit.

If the computer is connected to an electrical outlet that is incorrectly connected to the building wiring, serious electrical shock could result.

Continued protection against electrical shock . For continued protection against the risk of electrical shock, follow these steps:

- Connect your computer only to an electrical outlet of the correct voltage. If you are unsure about the voltage of the electrical outlet you are using, contact your local power company.
- If your computer has cables other than the power cords, you must connect them before plugging the power cords into an electrical outlet. Before removing these cables, you must first unplug the power cords from the outlet.
- If your computer has a telephone connection, do not touch the telephone cords when there is lightning in the area.
- Do not use or store the computer in an area where it can become wet.

- Make sure all replacement parts have characteristics identical or equivalent to the original parts. Other parts may not have the same safety features.
- Personal injury or electrical shock may result if you undertake actions other than those specifically described in this book. This is particularly true if you try to service or repair the power supply, monitor, or built-in modem. Always refer service or repairs to qualified service personnel.



Caution!

Your computer uses lithium batteries. There may be a risk of fire, explosion, or burns if the batteries are handled incorrectly. To ensure safety:

Do not recharge, disassemble, heat, or incinerate a lithium battery.

Replace the battery with an identical or equivalent type lithium battery.

Do not throw or immerse the battery into the water.

Discard used lithium batteries according to local country dispositions.

Each time you open your computer, you must follow specific safety procedures to ensure that you do not damage your computer. For your safety, and the safety of your equipment, follow the steps for “Disconnecting your computer” on page 7 before you remove the cover of the system unit (if included with the model you purchased).

Connecting your computer. To connect your computer:

- 1 Turn off the computer and any external devices (such as a monitor or printer) that have their own power switches.
- 2 Attach a signal cable to each external device (such as a monitor or printer), and then connect the other end of the signal cable to the computer.
- 3 Attach communication cables (such as modem cables or network cables) to the computer. Then, attach the other ends of the cables to properly wired communication outlets.
- 4 Attach the power cords to the computer and any external devices (such as a monitor or printer), and then connect the other ends of the power cords to properly grounded electrical outlets.

To avoid shock hazard:

Do not connect or disconnect any cables or perform installation, maintenance, or reconfiguration of this product during an electrical storm.

The power cord must be connected to a properly wired and grounded receptacle.

- 1 Turn off the computer and any attached devices that have their own power switches.

- 4 Disconnect all cables and cords from the computer; this includes power cords, signal cables from external devices, communication cables, and any other cables attached to the computer.

Chapter 2

Ergonomics

Arranging a comfortable and productive work area



Note

The computer you purchased may have components which are different from those shown here.

Arranging your work area

When you arrange your computer, position your monitor and keyboard directly in front of you. Place the mouse close to the keyboard so that you can use it without stretching or leaning over to one side.

The system unit is usually kept on the floor under or beside your desk. Be sure to place it in an area that will not block the space you need to put your legs under the work surface.

Organize your desk to reflect the way you use work materials and equipment. Place the things that you use most regularly, such as a mouse or telephone, within the easiest reach.

Choosing a chair

You should adjust your chair so that your thighs are horizontal and there is support for your lower back. Your feet should rest flat on the floor or a foot rest when you are seated and using your keyboard.

Positioning the monitor

- Place the monitor at a comfortable viewing distance. You can also use the length of your arm to determine a comfortable viewing distance.
- Adjust your monitor so the top of the screen is at, or slightly below, eye level.
- Keep the screen clean. For cleaning instructions, refer to the documentation that came with your monitor.
- If you place the monitor near a window, consider using curtains or blinds to minimize glare from sunlight. Also be sure to keep the monitor perpendicular to the windows to reduce glare when the curtains or blinds are open. Try to avoid placing the monitor directly in front of a window.
- Use dim room lighting. If you need more light on your work, you should position the light so it shines on your work surface but not onto the monitor screen.
- Use the monitor controls to adjust the screen's brightness and contrast levels to a comfortable level. You may have to do this more than once a day if the light in the room changes. For monitor control adjustment instructions, refer to the documentation that came with your monitor.
- When your eyes focus on a specific object for a long period of time, they may become tired. If you spend a lot of time looking at your screen, remember to take

frequent breaks. Look up periodically and focus on an object that is further away. This will give the muscles in your eyes a chance to relax.

Positioning the keyboard

- Make sure the keyboard height is comfortable for typing.
- When you type, the keyboard should be positioned so that your arms are relaxed and comfortable, and your forearms are roughly horizontal. Your shoulders should be relaxed and not hunched up.
- Type with a light touch, keeping your hands and fingers relaxed. Your wrists should also be straight.
- If your computer came with a wristrest and you choose to use it, do not rest your hands on the wristrest or desktop while you are typing. Instead, use the wristrest only when resting. If you prefer not to use the wristrest, you may remove it and use the keyboard without it.

Positioning the mouse

- Position your mouse on the same surface as your keyboard so that they are at the same level. Allow enough space so that you can use your mouse without stretching or leaning over.
- When you use the mouse, hold it lightly with all your fingers and click gently. Move the mouse with your entire arm instead of only using your wrist.

Chapter 3

Using your IBM PC

Using your IBM PC

This chapter contains basic information on how to use some of the hardware and software features of your computer.

Hardware

Using the Rapid Access™ II keyboard

The Rapid Access keyboard contains some buttons and controls that might be new to you.

Rapid Access Buttons are shortcut buttons on the keyboard that start a program, open a file, browse a Web page, or perform a specific function when you press them. These keys allow you to go straight to a file, program, or Internet address with the press of a button instead of having to click on an icon, search for the program in the Start menu, or type an Internet address in your browser.

Some of the Rapid Access Buttons are preset to support important functions on your computer (Mute, Volume, and the CD/DVD controls); these cannot be changed.

There are seven Rapid Access Buttons across the top of the keyboard. The preset functions are printed on the label above the buttons. You can customize five of the buttons to start any program or Web page. For example, if you enjoy playing Solitaire, you can customize a Rapid Access Button to open the Solitaire program. The Help and Standby buttons have preset functions that you cannot customize. Press the Help button to start the IBM Help system. Press the Standby button to put your computer in suspend mode to save power while the computer is temporarily not in use. The Standby button lights up while the computer is in suspend mode. To exit from the suspend mode, press the computer power switch.

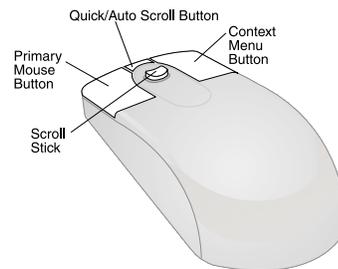
To customize a Rapid Access Button.

- 1 From the Windows desktop, click **Start**.
- 2 Select **Settings**, and then click **Control Panel**.
- 3 Double-click **Keyboard (Rapid Access)**. The Rapid Access Keyboard Customization program starts.
- 4 Follow the instructions on the screen.

To learn more about the Rapid Access keyboard, click **Help** on any of the Rapid Access Keyboard Customization screens.

Using the IBM ScrollPoint™ II mouse

The ScrollPoint II mouse has the following controls:



Primary mouse button. Use this button to select or start a program or menu item.

Quick/Auto scroll button. Use this button to put the mouse into auto-scroll mode. When the mouse is in auto-scroll mode, the movement of the mouse controls the scrolling direction and speed. To exit from the auto-scroll mode, click any of the mouse buttons.

Context menu button. Use this button to access a context menu for an active program, icon, or object.

Using your IBM PC

Scroll stick. Use this stick to control the scrolling action of the mouse. This stick is pressure sensitive. The direction in which you apply pressure controls the direction of the scrolling action. The amount of pressure you apply controls the scrolling speed.

To customize the behaviour of the mouse buttons, change pointers, or modify other mouse features to meet your individual needs, do the following:

- 1 From the Windows desktop, click **Start**.
- 2 Select **Settings**, and then click **Control Panel**.
- 3 Double-click **Mouse**. The Mouse Properties window opens.
- 4 Click on the applicable tab and follow the instructions on the screen.

To learn more about the ScrollPoint II mouse, click **Help** on any of the Mouse Properties screens.

Handling discs

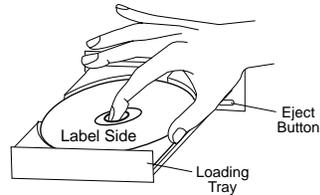
The computer you purchased came with either a Compact Disc (CD) or Digital Versatile Disc (DVD) drive. To insert a CD or DVD into the drive:

- 1 Open the loading tray by pressing the **Eject** button on the drive.
- 2 Remove the disc from the sleeve or case.
- 3 Place the disc into the circular recess of the tray. Make sure that the label on the disc is facing up. Some DVDs are recorded on both sides of the disc.



Attention

If your drive tray has clips, make sure they are retracted before you insert a disc.



- 4 Close the loading tray by pressing the **Eject** button. You can also push gently on the front of the tray until it begins to retract.

IBM Help and Software

Your computer came with several types of information and software. This chapter includes information about:

- Access IBM
- Readme files
- Software installed on CD or DVD

Access IBM

The Access IBM program is preinstalled on your computer and is accessible from the Windows desktop. It provides the following:

- Start up - This selection provides topics about setting up your computer.
- How do I...? - This selection provides topics describing how to complete specific tasks.
- Customize - This selection provides information about customizing the Access IBM program.
- Get help - This selection provides help information and ways of getting help from IBM.

Using your IBM PC

Readme files

Another type of online information is available in README.TXT files. These files usually come with programs and contain information about additional features. README.TXT files also may contain instructions about setting up the program to run most efficiently.

Installing programs

Some programs might have been provided with your computer either on CD-ROM, DVD-ROM, or preinstalled on your hard disk. The titles vary by model and by country or region. To locate the programs installed on your hard disk, do the following:

- 1 From the Windows desktop, click **Start**.
- 2 Select **Programs**. You see a listing of programs and folders containing programs.

Some entertainment programs that may have come with your computer may contain language not suitable for children. The Entertainment Software Review Board (ESRB), has reviewed many software programs and maintains a list of program titles and ratings. To find a rating for a program, contact the ESRB Web site at <http://www.esrb.org>.

Note

In some cases, the hard disk drive in the model you purchased may not be large enough to complete a full install of each program. In these cases, use the “partial install” option if you want to install all of the programs to the same hard disk drive.

Using and installing software with the AutoPlay feature.

Most discs are “AutoPlay enabled”. If the AutoPlay feature of Windows is enabled, it will automatically start the installation program (or the first song of a music CD) when you insert a disc in the drive. For more information about AutoPlay, refer to the Microsoft Windows help system.

Some programs install on your hard disk drive, but also require a CD or DVD to be in the drive before the program will start. If the program is already installed and you insert the disc, the AutoPlay feature will start the program automatically.

If your IBM computer has a DVD-ROM drive, the AutoPlay feature will always start AutoPlay-enabled CDs or DVDs. If there are no AutoPlay-enabled programs on a DVD video disc, the AutoPlay feature will start the DVD video.

Updating programs

IBM Update Connector program. You can use the IBM Update Connector program to look for available updates for the software that came from the factory with your computer.

Norton AntiVirus program. If you have Norton Antivirus installed, you can update the Norton AntiVirus program using the Norton Live Update program. This program will automatically apply available updates to the Norton AntiVirus program.

Chapter 4

Troubleshooting

Troubleshooting

Diagnosing and recovering from problems

This chapter contains information that can help you solve common problems that you might have with your computer.

You should look through this chapter to find the problem description or error code that matches the problem you are having. When you find the description, simply follow the steps to solve the problem. Some problems have multiple steps. You should follow the steps until the problem is solved. A problem description may contain steps which you may not be required to follow.

The information contained in this chapter is intended for several models of the IBM Personal Computer. The computer you purchased may not have some of the hardware discussed in these sections.

If your computer did not come with the hardware described, some of the troubleshooting information may not apply. For example, if the model you purchased did not contain a Rapid Access keyboard, instructions about the Rapid Access keyboard will not apply. Follow the steps for the hardware that came with your computer.

If you follow the steps in this chapter and the problem continues, you can still get help. See "HelpWare support and services" on page 81 for more information about contacting IBM.

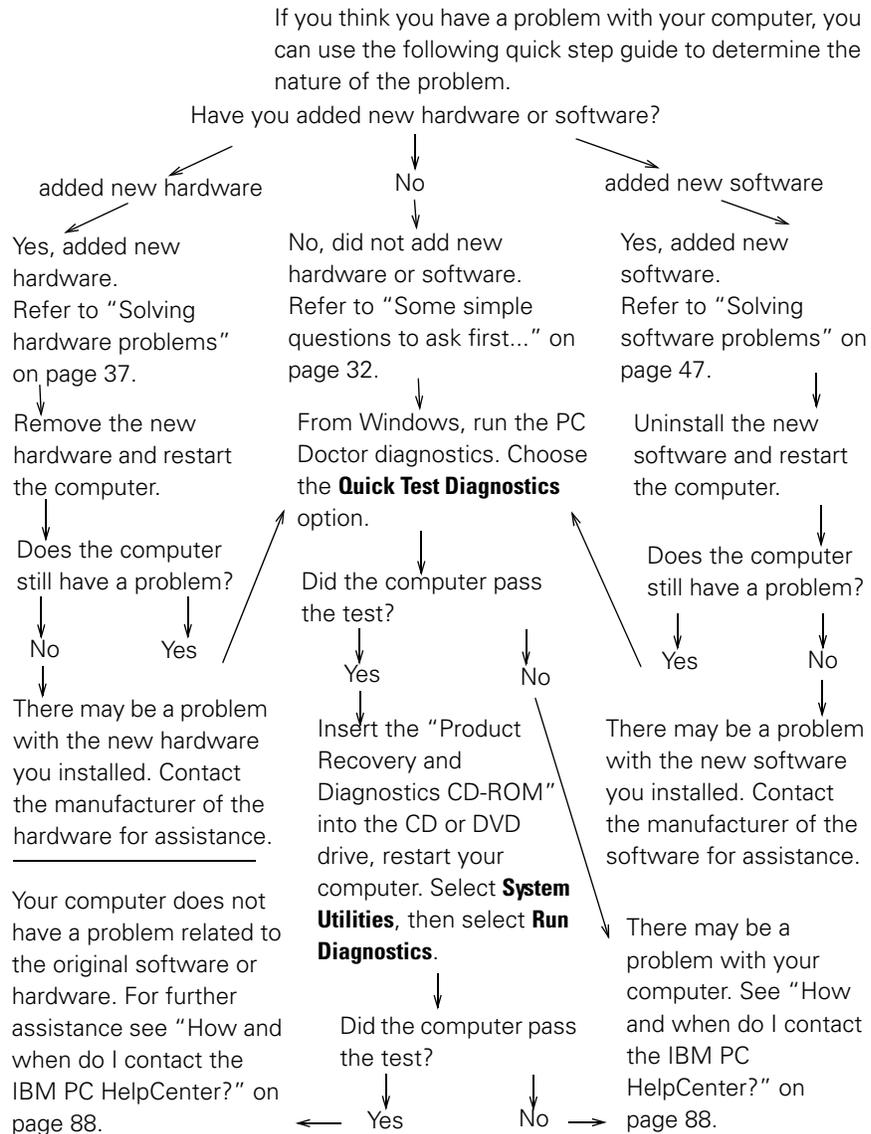
To run the diagnostics programs, do the following:

- 1** Insert the "Product Recovery and Diagnostics CD-ROM" in the CD drive.
- 2** Shut down the operating system and turn off your computer. Wait for the power light to turn off.
- 3** Turn on your computer.

- 4 When you see the Main Menu, use the arrow keys to select **System Utilities**.
- 5 On the System Utilities menu, select **Run Diagnostics**.
- 6 From the menu bar, select **Diagnostics** and select **Run Normal Test**.

Quick step guide



Some simple questions to ask first...

Are both the computer and monitor power lights lit?

Yes Power is reaching the system and monitor. See “Did the system beep after it was turned on?” on page 33.

No

- 1 Press the On/Off buttons on the computer and monitor to make sure they are turned on.
- 2 Make sure the power switch that is attached to the power supply at the back of the system unit is pressed in the on position (“1” is on, “0” is off). This power switch may not be available for all computers.
- 3 Make sure the system unit and monitor cables are correctly and securely connected. Make sure the system unit and monitor power cords are plugged into electrical outlets. The *Setup Poster* shows how the cables and cords should be connected.
- 4 Make sure the electrical outlets you are using are not controlled by a wall or dimmer switch.
If you are using a multiple outlet device (for example, a power surge protector or power strip), make sure it is plugged in and turned on.



If any of these problems continue after taking the actions listed, run the diagnostics programs that came with your computer. If you need service, see “HelpWare support and services” on page 81.

Troubleshooting

Did the system beep after it was turned on?

Yes

There may be a hardware problem.

- If you added hardware, remove it and restart the computer to see if the problem is corrected. If the problem is corrected, you may not have installed your hardware correctly. Reinstall your hardware. For instructions on installing hardware in the system unit, see Chapter 7, "Adding and removing hardware." If the problem is not corrected, see "Solving hardware problems" on page 37.
- Make sure that the system memory modules are properly installed. If the memory is not installed correctly, the system will beep several times (in a 2 long beeps - 3 short beeps sequence). Reinstall the memory modules. If you hear a beep sequence other than the 2 long-3 short beeps, or if the memory modules are installed correctly, see "HelpWare support and services" on page 81 for information on obtaining service.
- If you have not added hardware, see "HelpWare support and services" on page 81 for information on obtaining service.

Yes, more than once

There is a problem with the system unit. Find the error code or message in the section "Responding to error codes" on page 58.

Recovering factory installed programs and files



Note

Some models ship with the ConfigSafe program, which runs in the background. ConfigSafe automatically takes a snapshot of your configuration files. Before doing a full recovery, you might want to start ConfigSafe and restore system files to see if an earlier snapshot might fix your problem.

Your IBM PC came with programs and files installed on the hard disk drive. These pre-installed programs and files are also included on the "Product Recovery and Diagnostics CD-ROM" disc. In some cases, the original programs and files on the hard disk drive can become corrupted. If this happens, you will need to reinstall them on the hard disk drive.

You may also install programs and create your own files. When you install programs, the installation process can change certain configuration files that the operating system uses. You should make regular backup copies of these configuration files and any files you created.

When you make backup copies of the operating system configuration files, you should copy the original directory structure. When you reinstall the files, you must put them into the original directory structure. If you do not, the computer may not work properly.

To recover the factory installed system and program files, follow these steps:

Note: All personal data in the computer will be lost.

- 1 Make sure your computer is turned on.
- 2 Make backup copies of configuration files and any files you created.
- 3 Insert the "Product Recovery and Diagnostics CD-ROM" disc into your CD or DVD drive.
- 4 Make sure you do not have a diskette, CD, or DVD in any other drive.
- 5 Shut down and turn off your computer.
- 6 Wait 15 seconds.
- 7 Turn on your monitor and computer.

Troubleshooting

- 8** When you see the IBM Product Recovery Program Main Menu, select **Full Recovery** and follow the instructions on the screen.
- 9** Remove the disc before you restart your computer at the end of the recovery.
- 10** After the IBM software has been reinstalled, copy your personal configuration and data files back into their original directories on the hard disk drive.

If you need to use the “Product Recovery and Diagnostics CD-ROM” disc, you should make sure that the Setup Utility is set up to use the CD or DVD drive before the hard disk. You can change the startup sequence by choosing “Start Options” from the main Configuration/Setup Utility. For more information about selecting startup devices in the Setup Utility, see the Setup Utility help.

Reinstalling device drivers

When you reinstall device drivers, you are changing the current configuration of your computer. Only reinstall device drivers if you know that it is necessary to do this in order to correct a problem on your computer. Copies of the device drivers that came preinstalled on your IBM are located on the IBM “Product Recovery and Diagnostics CD-ROM” in a folder called “Drivers”.

If you need to reinstall a device driver, refer to the “Drivers” folder on the CD-ROM and choose the appropriate device subfolder. Drivers can be reinstalled using one of the following methods:

- In the device subfolder, look for a “Readme.txt” or another file with the “.txt” extension. Sometimes this file may be named after the operating system, such as “Win98.txt”. The text file will contain information

on how to reinstall that device driver.

or

- Use the Add New Hardware program (located in the Control Panel) to reinstall the driver. Not all drivers can be reinstalled in this manner. If the device subfolder contains an ".inf" file, you can use the Add New Hardware program. In the Add New Hardware program, when prompted for the device driver you want to install, select **Have Disk**, and **Browse**. Then select the appropriate device driver file from the IBM "Product Recovery and Diagnostics CD-ROM"

or

- In the device subfolder, look for a Setup.exe file. Double-click on the Setup.exe file and follow the instructions on the screen.

Chapter 5

Setup Utility

Setup Utility

Your IBM Personal Computer comes ready to use. You can use the Setup Utility and the Windows Device Manager to view your computer's configuration settings.

You can also use the Setup Utility to change some configuration settings. If you add or replace hardware inside your computer, you might need to verify or update specific settings.

This chapter contains instructions for how to use the Setup Utility. If you need additional information about the Setup Utility options, see the Setup Utility help.

Using the Setup Utility

The Setup Utility lets you view and change configuration settings for hardware installed in your computer. You might need to use the Setup Utility if you upgrade the hardware in your computer or if you get an error message while using your computer.

Automatic changes

In most cases, your computer's Basic Input/Output System (BIOS) can make changes automatically. When you install new hardware, the BIOS detects it during the Power-On Self-Test (POST) and automatically updates the Setup Utility.

Manual changes

In some cases, your computer will not make changes automatically. For example, if you install hardware that does not meet Plug and Play requirements, you will need to start the Setup Utility and make changes manually.

The Setup Utility includes the following hardware and configuration information:

- Processor speed
- System and cache memory
- Disk drives
- Serial and parallel ports
- USB and audio options
- Power Management features
- Startup options
- Model information
- Date and time
- Security options

You will not be able to change some Setup Utility options like system and model information because they contain information about the system. Other options let you control how your computer operates. For example, you can use the Setup Utility to:

- Create or change a power-on password.
- Reduce energy consumption with Power Management features.
- Enable or disable the system memory test.

Starting the Setup Utility

Sometimes, when you get an error message, your computer displays a message window with an error code and a description of the problem. When this occurs, you can press the **F1** key to start the Setup Utility. Otherwise, to access the Setup Utility, you must either start or restart your computer.

Setup Utility

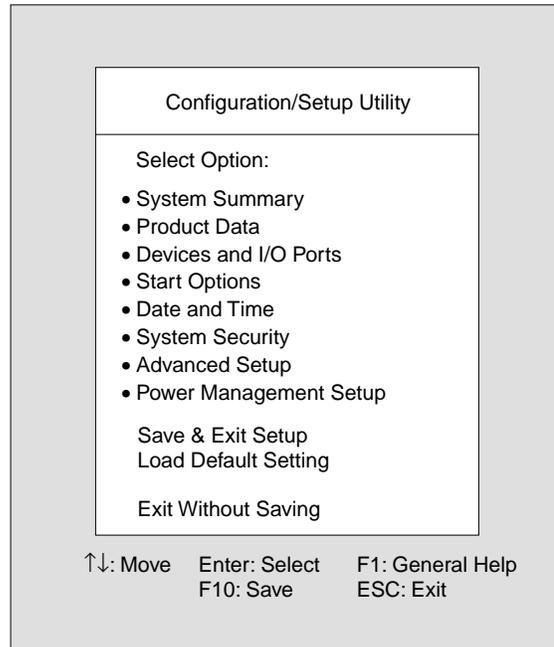
To start the Setup Utility when your computer is on, follow these steps:

- 1 Save all open files and close all software programs.
- 2 Click the **Start** button on your Windows desktop.
- 3 Click the **Shut Down** option.
- 4 From the Shut Down Windows window, click **Restart the computer** and then click the **Yes** button.
- 5 When the IBM logo screen appears, press the **F1** key.

To start the Setup Utility when your computer is off, follow these steps:

- 1 Turn on your monitor.
- 2 Turn on your system.
- 3 When the IBM logo screen appears, press the **F1** key.

The Setup Utility main menu appears:



Working with the Setup Utility menus

The Setup main menu lists system configuration options. When you select one of these options, a menu for that option appears.



Note

The main menu you see on your computer may look slightly different from the menu shown here, but it will operate the same way.

Setup Utility

To move through menus, use the following keys:

Keys	Function
↑ ↓	Use these arrow keys to highlight an option on the menu. (Press the Enter key to choose the option.)
← →	Use these arrow keys to make a selection and change an option's setting. On some menus, you can use these keys to move from one field to another.
Enter	Press this key to choose a highlighted option from a menu.
Esc	After viewing or making changes to the settings on a menu, press this key to exit the menu.
F1	Press this key if you want general help information.
F10	Press this key if you want to save changes you made.



Note

Not all keys on the list are available on every menu. The available keys appear on the bottom of that menu.

Viewing system information and model information

To view general hardware information about your computer, select the **System Summary** option from the Setup main menu. The items displayed in the System Information menu are not configurable.

Setup automatically updates this menu when you do either of the following:

- Add or change hardware on your computer

- Make changes to other menus in Setup and save those changes

To view other computer information such as the model number, serial number, and the BIOS version and date, select the **Product Data** option from the Setup main menu. Like in the System Summary menu, the items displayed are not configurable.

Changing parameter settings

In the Setup menus, all configuration information that you can change is enclosed in brackets like these: []. You cannot change any information that is not enclosed in brackets. Use the up or down arrow keys to highlight options then press **Enter** to display a menu. When changing the setting of a particular parameter, highlight the setting then use the left or right arrow key to change the setting. Refer to the Setup Utility help for details on the configurable parameters in each menu.

Loading the default settings

When you purchase an IBM computer, it is already configured for use. The original configuration settings, also called *factory* or *default settings*, are stored in the CMOS. Setup includes an option **Load Default Setting** that lets you reload the original configuration at any time.

To reload the default settings, follow these steps:

- 1** Select the **Load Default Setting** option from the main menu. A dialog box appears confirming if you want to load the default settings.
- 2** Press **Y**, then press **Enter**.
- 3** Select the **Save & Exit Setup** option from the main menu. A dialog box appears saying "SAVE to CMOS and EXIT (Y/N)?".

Setup Utility

- 4 Press **Y**, then press **Enter** to save the changes in CMOS.

You must load the Setup default settings in the following instances:

- when you replace the system battery
- when you customize your system configuration settings and some resource assignments conflict causing the computer to stop responding.

Exiting Setup

Press **Esc** to return to the main menu when you have finished viewing settings and making changes. From this location, you can exit Setup and save your changes or exit without saving your changes.

Do either of the following to exit setup:

- If you would like to save your changes, select the **Save & Exit** option. Press **Y** then press **Enter** to save your changes and exit Setup.
- If you do not want to save your changes, select the **Exit Without Saving** option. Press **Y** then press **Enter** to exit Setup without saving.

What do I do first?

What is IBM HelpWare?

IBM HelpWare is a comprehensive set of technical support and service options.

IBM HelpWare has a variety of services and solutions for you. These options are available from IBM whenever you need help for as long as you own your IBM Personal Computer. Even when your warranty period expires, HelpWare will still be there to support you with services available for purchase.

Read on to find out when and what methods of support are available at no additional charge and when charges will apply.

Need quick help?

There are two ways to get help quickly from IBM:

Internet	Refer to the section titled "How do I get help electronically?" on page 85 for your country's Internet address.
Telephone	Refer to the section titled "How and when do I contact the IBM PC HelpCenter?" on page 88 for information about the telephone services of HelpWare.

What can I do on my own?

Sometimes you can quickly solve problems that you may have with your computer. We've given you several different methods you can use to solve problems on your own. If you need to, you can still contact IBM for support. There is more information about telephone support in the section titled "How and when do I contact the IBM PC HelpCenter?" on page 88.

Printed documentation. The documentation that came with your computer contains information about troubleshooting hardware and software problems. This information begins with the quick step-by-step guide on page 31, which can help you diagnose hardware and software problems. Once you know the nature of the problem, you can follow the instructions in the "Troubleshooting" section on page 27. Just match the description or error codes with your question and follow the instructions to solve the problem!

Online documentation. Your computer also came with several online resources you can use to solve problems.

Help files. The operating system and most preloaded programs on your computer contain online Help files. Help files may contain information for questions on how to solve problems and prevent future trouble.

Readme files. Most operating systems and software programs also come with a file named README.TXT. This is a text file that contains important information about the program. You can read README.TXT files by opening them in any text file editor on your computer. If an IBM Readme file is provided, it is named IBM.TXT.

Software. Your computer came with several software programs which can help you solve problems or find answers to your questions.

Diagnostics. Your computer came with a diagnostic program which can help identify problems you may have with your computer. You can run the *PC Doctor* diagnostic program from Access IBM in Windows or the "Product Recovery and Diagnostics CD-ROM" disc.

The Windows version of PC Doctor works through the Windows operating system to find system software problems. The "Product Recovery and Diagnostics CD-ROM" contains the MS-DOS version of the PC Doctor diagnostics program. This system utility performs tests directly on the hardware. It is important to run both of these programs before you contact the IBM PC HelpCenter. If you have not yet installed the Windows version of PC Doctor, you must first install the program from the "Software Selections CD-ROM" that came with your computer.

IBM Update Connector. This program allows you to connect to the IBM PC HelpCenter to receive updates for some of the software that came with your system and download them. Once you have received the files, you can begin the automated installation process. IBM Update Connector is available to registered IBM customers during the warranty period at no additional charge. Telephone line charges may apply.

How do I get help electronically?

Electronic support

There are many different ways to receive technical support and information if you have questions or problems. Electronic support is easy to use, quick, and very thorough. Best of all, the only charges that typically apply are the ones you pay to your telephone company or the company you use to log onto the World Wide Web. Here are some of the electronic support options that you can use.

Internet. You can use the Universal Resource Locator (URL) to contact us on the Internet. When you link to the IBM PC support home page, you can search for technical tips, download update drivers and find out about many other things.

Express Maintenance

Customers in the United States and Canada have “Express Maintenance” which is a parts exchange service that allows IBM HelpCenter personnel to replace selected in-warranty hardware parts and ship them directly to your door. This means you won’t have to completely disassemble your computer and take it to an authorized IBM servicer for repair. Some servicers function as drop-off points that may send your system to another location for repair.

When you call for Express Maintenance at 1-919-517-2800, your credit card information will be requested, but it will not be billed if you return the defective part to IBM within 30 days of your receipt of the new part. If the part is not returned within 30 days, your card will be charged the full retail price of the part. Credit card information will not be made available to anyone outside IBM.

International Warranty Service - not available

International Warranty Service (IWS) is an IBM program that is available on selected IBM Commercial PC products. IWS allows customers who travel or need to move products to another country to register the products with IBM's International Warranty Service Office (IWSO). Upon registering the product with the IWSO, IBM will issue a certificate that will be honored wherever IBM or IBM resellers sell and service IBM Commercial PC products. The IWS program is not available for your IBM computer.

Adding and removing hardware



Danger!

Electrical current from power, telephone, and communications cables is hazardous. To avoid shock hazard, use the steps described in this section to disconnect cables when installing, moving, or opening the cover of this product.

This chapter contains basic information about:

- adding drives, memory, and adapter cards
- identifying system board components
- replacing the battery

These instructions do not contain complete information about each option you can install in or remove from your computer. Also, these instructions do not imply whether the drive bays in your model are empty or populated at the factory.

Preparing to work with the computer



Danger!

To avoid shock hazard, do not connect or disconnect any cables or perform installation, maintenance, or reconfiguration of this product during an electrical storm.

Before you make any changes to hardware in your computer, you must turn off and unplug the computer.

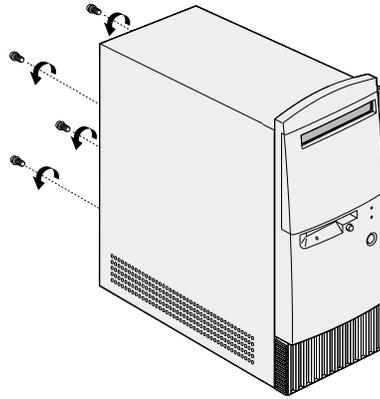
To disconnect

- 1** Turn off the computer and any attached devices that have their own power switches.
- 2** Unplug all power cables from electrical outlets.
- 3** Disconnect all communication cables (such as modem or network cables) from communication outlets.
- 4** Disconnect all cables and cords from the computer; this includes power cords, signal cables from external devices, communication cables, and any other cables attached to the computer.

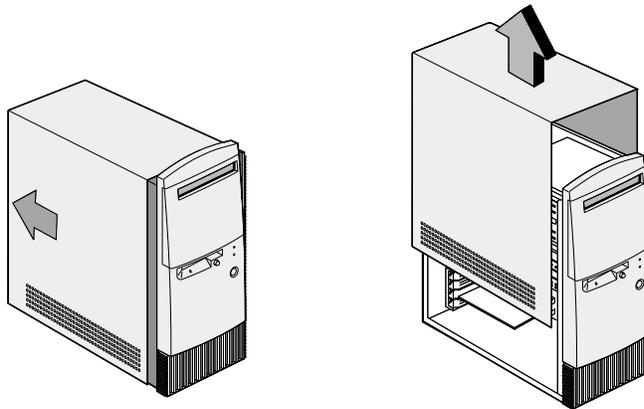
Removing and replacing the cover

Removing the cover:

- 1 Remove the four screws that secure the cover.



- 2 Slide back the cover about an inch and pull up to remove it completely.

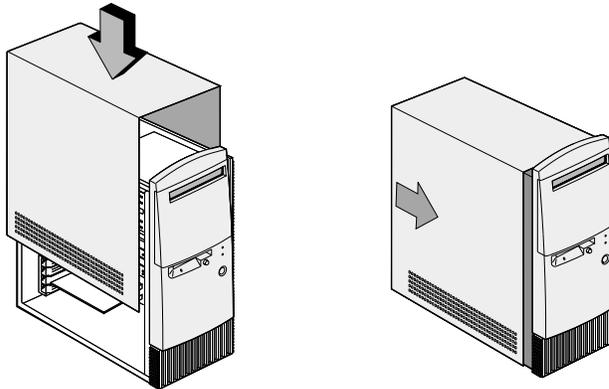


Adding and removing hardware

- 3 Touch an unpainted, metal portion of the chassis before touching any internal components.
- 4 While you are working inside the system unit, periodically touch an unpainted, metal portion of the chassis to minimize the chance of damage to the components by static electricity.

Replacing the cover:

- 1 Set down the cover on the chassis with about an inch gap with the chassis.
- 2 Slide the cover forward until it fits into place.

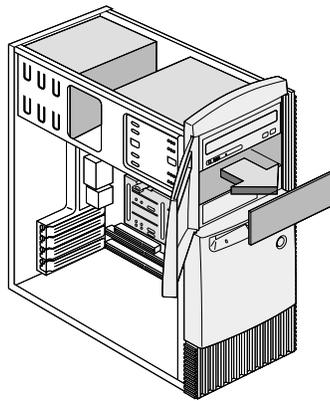


- 3 Align the screw holes and secure the cover with four screws.

Adding and removing drives

To install a drive in the upper drive bay:

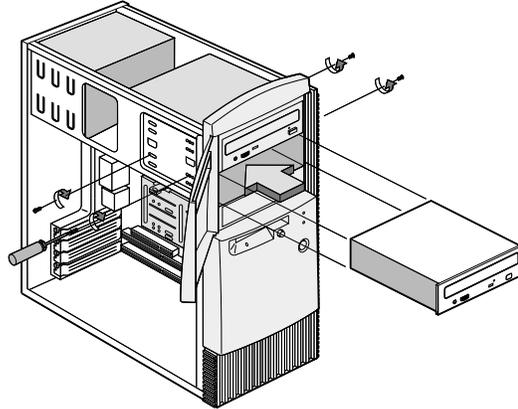
- 1 Turn off the computer.
- 2 Remove the system cover.
- 3 Open the front cover.
- 4 Push back and remove the plastic bay cover.



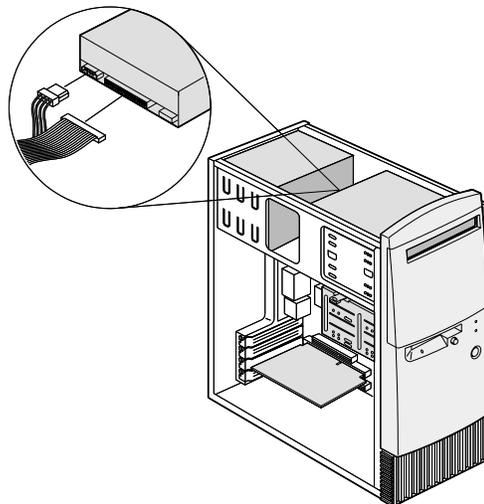
- 5 Insert the drive into the bay.

Adding and removing hardware

- 6 Align the screw holes and secure the drive with four screws.



- 7 Connect the power and signal cables.



- 8 Reinstall the cover and reconnect the cables to the back of the system unit. Then, reconnect the power cord to the back of the system unit and plug the other end of the cord into a properly grounded electrical outlet.

To remove the drive:

To remove a drive from a specific bay, reverse the steps for installing a drive in that bay.

To install a drive in the lower drive bay:

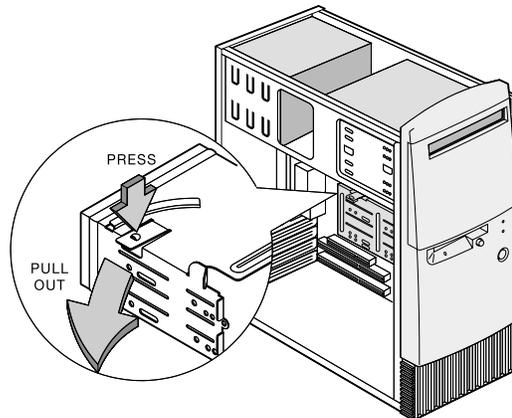
- 1 Disconnect the cables from the existing drive.
- 2 Remove the 3.5-inch drive bay from the housing by pressing the tab on top and pivoting the drive bay outward.



Note

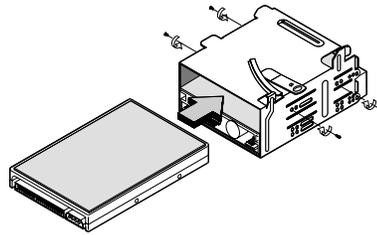
Write down the original location of the drive power and signal cables. You will need this information when you reinstall the drive.

The lowest drive bay can only be used for a drive that does not require external access, such as a slim hard disk.

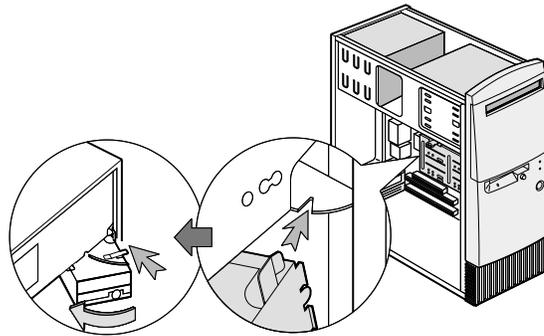

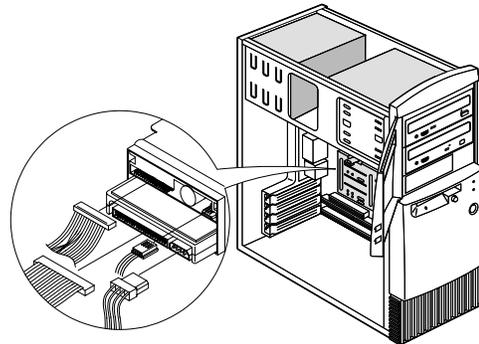
- 3** From the back of the drive bay, carefully insert a 3.5-inch disk drive then secure it with four screws on the sides.



- 4** Reinstall the drive bay into the housing as in the following figure:
 - a** Align the drive bay with the notch.
 - b** Pivot the drive bay toward the housing until the tab clicks into place.



- 5 Connect the signal and power cables to the drives.



- 6 Reinstall the cover and reconnect the cables to the back of the system unit. Then, reconnect the power cord to the back of the system unit and plug the other end of the cord into a properly grounded electrical outlet.

To remove the drive:

To remove a drive from a specific bay, reverse the steps for installing a drive in that bay.

Adding and removing adapter cards



Note

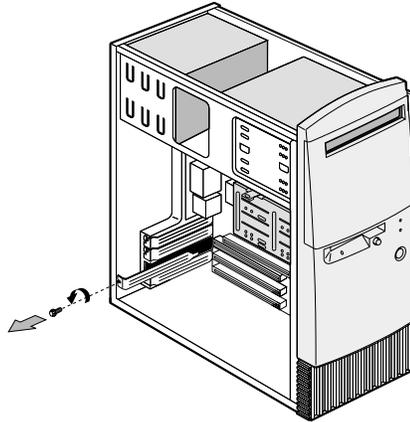
The computer can accommodate up to 3 PCI adapter cards and 1 AGP adapter card. The number of unused PCI connectors varies by model.

To install an adapter card:

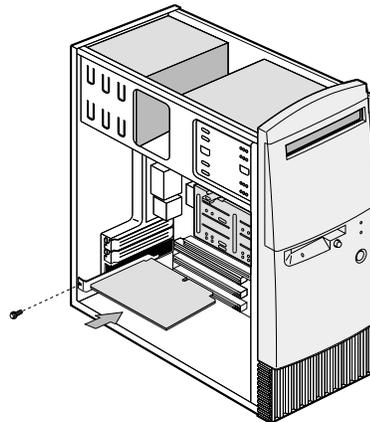
- 1 Turn off the computer.
- 2 Remove the system cover.

Adding and removing hardware

- 3 Remove the screw that secures the adapter card slot cover. Then remove the slot cover.



- 4 Align and insert the adapter card into the adapter card connector.
- 5 Secure the card with the screw you removed in Step 3.



- 6** Except for the original slot cover, reinstall all hardware and screws you removed prior to the installation of the adapter card. Save the original slot cover to use again in case you remove the adapter card.
- 7** If the adapter card came with one or more cables, connect the cables to the correct connectors on the system board or drive. If you disconnected any cables to gain access to the adapter card connector on the system board, reconnect the cables.
- 8** Reinstall the cover and reconnect the cables to the back of the system unit. Then, reconnect the power cord to the back of the system unit and plug the other end of the cord into a properly grounded electrical outlet.

If after you turn on your computer you receive a message asking you to insert the Windows CD to search for the required files, then search for these files in the C:\Windows\Options\Cabs directory on your hard drive instead.

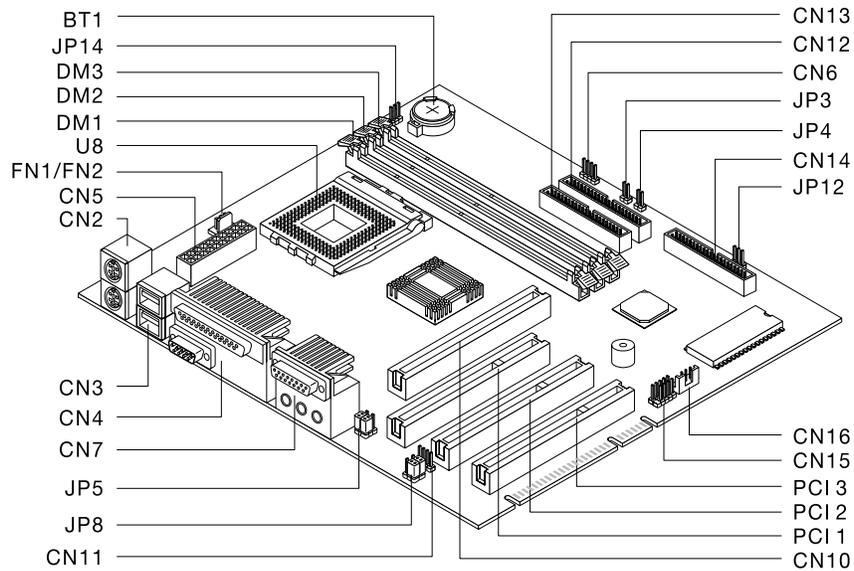
To remove an adapter card:

- 1** Position the system unit so that the card is accessible to you.
- 2** If the adapter card has cables, disconnect them. Be sure to take note of where the cables are connected. You will have to reconnect these cables when you reinstall the card.
- 3** Remove the adapter card screw.
- 4** Firmly hold the adapter card and carefully pull it from the card connector.
- 5** If you are not reinstalling the card, reinstall all hardware and screws you removed prior to the removal of the adapter card.

Identifying system board components

The system comes with a system board that looks like the figure shown below. This figure is followed by a list of labeled components and their corresponding functions.

Upgrading the system memory

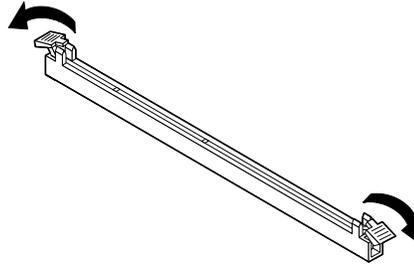
Your system board has three system memory module sockets: DM1, DM2, and DM3. These sockets hold Dual Inline Memory Modules (DIMMs) that contain 3.3V single- or dual-sided synchronous DRAM (SDRAM). See the system board layout figure page 111 for the location of the sockets on the system board.

You can install up to a maximum of 768 MB of system memory into these sockets.

Adding and removing hardware

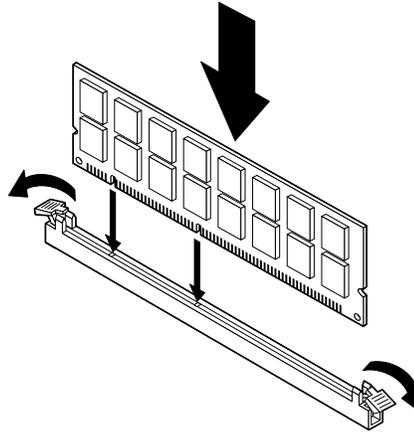
To install a DIMM:

- 1 Turn off the computer.
- 2 Remove the system cover.
- 3 Locate the system memory socket where you want to install the memory module.
- 4 Press back the clips on both ends of the socket to open them.



- 5 Insert the memory module by lining up the notches in the base of the module with the notches in the memory module on the system board. Slide the module between the guides on the side of the socket.

- 6 Press the memory module into the socket until the clips on both ends click to hold the module in place.



- 7 If you disconnected any cables to gain access to the memory module sockets on the system board, reconnect the cables.
- 8 Reinstall the cover and reconnect the cables to the back of the system unit. Then, reconnect the power cord to the back of the system unit and plug the other end of the cord into a properly grounded electrical outlet.

To remove a DIMM:

To remove a DIMM, press the holding clips on both sides of the socket outward to release the DIMM.

To verify the system memory:

To view the system memory settings, enter Setup and select **System Summary** from the Setup main menu. See "Starting the Setup Utility" on page 74 for information on how to enter Setup.

Replacing the system battery



Caution!

Your computer uses lithium batteries. There may be a risk of fire, explosion, or burns if the batteries are handled incorrectly. To ensure safety:

Do not recharge, disassemble, heat, or incinerate a lithium battery.

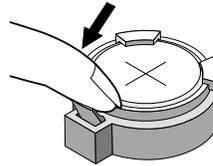
Replace the battery with an identical or equivalent type lithium battery.

Discard used lithium batteries according to local country dispositions.

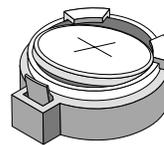
Your system battery lets your computer save important system information. Your computer comes with a 3-volt (CR2032) battery. If you replace it, you must use the same type.

Follow these steps to replace the battery:

- 1 Turn off the computer.
- 2 Remove the system cover.
- 3 Locate the battery on the system board. Refer to the board layout figure page 111.
- 4 Firmly press the center tab to release the battery.



- 5 Lift the battery from the holder with your fingers.
- 6 Slide the new battery into the holder with the "+" side up and then press it down until it clicks into place.



- 7 Discard the old battery according to local regulations.

When you restart your computer, you will probably get a message that your CMOS has changed. Use the Setup Utility to select **Load Default Setting**. See “Starting the Setup Utility” on page 74 for information on how to enter Setup.

You should also reset the computer’s time and date.
