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



Handling the ThinkPad computer

By using common sense and by following these handling tips, you will get the most use and enjoyment out of your computer for a long time to come.

This section provides tips for handling notebook computers in general. Some descriptions might not suit your situation. Check your shipping checklist to confirm the items you get with your computer.

Notebook computers are precision machines that require careful handling. Though your computer is designed and tested to be a durable notebook computer that functions reliably in normal work environments, you need to use some common sense in handling it.

ThinkPad don'ts

- Do not subject your computer to physical punishment, such as dropping or bumping.
- Do not place heavy objects on your computer.
- · Do not spill or allow liquids into your computer.
- Do not use your computer in or near water (to avoid the danger of electrical shock).
- Do not pack your computer in a tightly packed suitcase or bag.
 Your LCD might be damaged.

A scratchlike marking on your LCD might be a stain transferred from the keyboard (including from the TrackPoint stick) when the cover was pressed from the outside. Wipe such a stain gently with a dry soft cloth. If the stain remains, moisten the cloth with LCD cleaner and wipe the stain again. Be sure to dry the LCD before closing it.

- Do not disassemble your computer. Only an authorized IBM ThinkPad repair technician should disassemble and repair your computer.
- Do not scratch, twist, hit, or push the surface of your computer display.
- Do not place any objects between the display and the keyboard or under the keyboard.
- Do not pick up or hold your computer by the display. When
 picking up your open computer, hold it by the bottom (keyboard)
 half.

- Do not modify or tape the latches to keep the display open or closed.
- Do not turn your computer over while the ac adapter is plugged in. This could break the adapter plug.
- Do not move the computer when the hard disk drive is accessing data (when the indicator is blinking).
- Do not use or store your computer where the temperature is below 5° C or above 35° C (41° F and 95° F).
- Do not place your computer closer than 13 cm (5 in.) to any electrical appliance that generates a strong magnetic field, such as a motor, a magnet, a TV, a refrigerator, or large audio speakers.
- Do not put an operating cellular phone on the computer. The phone might cause a computer system malfunction.
- Do not hard-mount your computer in a vehicle or anywhere that it is subject to strong vibration.
- Do not crush, drop, or physically punish the external or removable hard disk, diskette, or CD-ROM drive when it is outside your computer.
- Do not press on the middle part of the diskette drive or the CD-ROM drive.
- Do not insert a diskette at an angle. Not inserting the diskette straight into the drive can damage the drive.
- Do not place more than one label on a diskette, and do not allow the label to be loose. Multiple or loose labels can detach or tear and then lodge in the drive.
- Do not touch the lens on the CD-ROM tray.
- Do not close the CD-ROM tray until you hear the CD-ROM click into the center pivot of the CD-ROM drive.
- Do not touch the surface of a compact disc; handle the compact disc only by its edges.
- Do not connect the modem to a PBX (private branch exchange) or other digital telephone extension line. Your computer can use only a public-switched telephone network (PSTN). Use of a phone line other than PSTN can damage your modem. If you are not sure which kind of phone line you are using, contact your telephone company. Many hotels or office buildings use digital telephone extension lines, so check before connecting the telephone cable in such places.
- Do not leave the base of your computer in contact with your lap or any part of your body for an extended period when the

computer is functioning or when the battery is charging. Your computer dissipates some heat during normal operation. This heat is a function of the level of system activity and battery charge level. Extended contact with your body, even through clothing, could cause discomfort or, eventually, a skin burn.

ThinkPad do's

Treat your computer like precision electronic machinery.

- When installing your hard disk, diskette, or CD-ROM drive, follow the instructions in this online book and apply pressure only where needed on the device.
- When installing the CD-ROM or diskette drive into the UltraslimBay, make sure the ac adapter is disconnected from your computer.
- If you exchange drives in your computer, reinstall the plastic bezel faces (if supplied).
- · Store your external and removable hard disk, diskette, and CD-ROM drives in the appropriate container or packaging when they are not being used.
- Choose a quality carrying case that will protect your computer.
- · Store packing materials safely out of reach of children to prevent the risk of suffocation from plastic bags.
- Register your ThinkPad products with IBM (refer to the Web pages: http://www.pc.ibm.com/register). This can help authorities return your computer to you if it is lost or stolen. Registering your computer also enables IBM to notify you about possible upgrades.
- Check the IBM Web pages (http://www.ibm.com/thinkpad) periodically to get current information about your computer.

Cleaning your computer

Occasionally clean your computer as follows:

- Use a soft cloth moistened with nonalkaline detergent to wipe the exterior of the computer.
- Don't spray cleaner directly on the display or keyboard.
- · Gently wipe the LCD with a dry, soft cloth.

Carrying your computer

When carrying your computer, follow these instructions to prevent possible damage to your computer and data:

- 1. Remove any media from the CD-ROM drive or diskette drive.
- 2. Turn off all attached devices.
- Power off the computer, or enter suspend or hibernation mode; then close the LCD. Make sure the suspend indicator is on when the computer is in suspend mode, or the power indicator is off when it is powered off or in hibernation mode.
- Unplug all external cables and cords connected to your computer.
- 5. Make sure all computer doors and covers are closed.
- 6. Use a quality carrying case that provides adequate cushion and protection.

Do not move the computer when the hard disk drive is accessing data—that is, when the indicator is blinking. Make sure the indicator is off before you carry the computer.

Extending the life of your computer's battery

The amount of battery power consumed by your computer depends on such conditions as the frequency of use, the operating temperature, and the period in storage (if unused). The following tips can help you to extend the life of your battery:

- Do not recharge the battery pack until all of its power is used.
 Recharging a battery pack that is not completely discharged can shorten battery life.
- Once you start charging the battery pack, do not use it until it is fully charged.
- Whenever possible, use the ThinkPad battery power-saving modes:
 - Screen blank
 - Standby
 - Hibernation

For more information, refer to the online user's guide:

- · Decrease the LCD brightness.
- Use power management. Each operating system comes with its own power management.

- If the internal serial devices—the modem, the serial port, and the infrared port—are not in use, stop the supply of power to them.
- If you will not be using the computer for a long period, remove the battery pack and keep it in a cool place.

Starting BIOS Setup Utility

Your computer provides a program, called IBM BIOS Setup Utility, that enables you to select various setup parameters. The panels in this utility are as follows:

- Config: Set the configuration of your computer.
- Date/Time: Set the date and time.
- Password: Set a password.
- Startup: Set the startup device.
- Restart: Restart the system.

Note: You can set parameters more easily by using the ThinkPad Configuration Program. For more information on this program, refer to the online user's guide.

To start IBM BIOS Setup Utility, do as follows:

- 1. To protect yourself against accidental loss of data, use ConfigSafe (see "Backing up your system configuration" on page 30) to save your computer's current configuration.
- 2. Remove any diskette from the diskette drive, and then turn off the computer.
- 3. Turn on the computer; then, while the "Press F1 for IBM BIOS Setup Utility" message is displayed at the lower-left area of the screen, press F1.
 - If you have set a supervisor password, the "IBM BIOS Setup Utility" menu appears after you enter the password. You can start the utility by pressing Enter instead of the supervisor password; then, however, you cannot change the parameters that are protected by the supervisor password. For more information, refer to the online user's guide.
- 4. Using the cursor keys, move to an item you want to change. When the item you want is highlighted, press Enter. A submenu is displayed.
- 5. Change the items you wish to change. To change the value of an item, use the F5 or F6 key. If the item has a submenu, you can display it by pressing Enter.
- 6. Press F3 or Esc to exit from the submenu.

Starting BIOS Setup Utility

If you are in a nested submenu, press Esc repeatedly until you reach the IBM BIOS Setup Utility menu.

Note: If you need to restore the settings to their original state as of the time of purchase, press the F9 key to load the default settings. Also, the Restart submenu offers you such options, as loading the default settings or discarding the changes.

7. Select **Restart**; then press Enter. Change the option you want; then press Enter. Your computer restarts.

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Using password

To make sure only authorized persons may work on your computer, you can set different kinds of passwords. Then prospective users will have to know the proper passwords in order to access your computer or data.

You can set the following passwords in your computer:

- · Power-on password
- · Screen saver password
- Hard-disk passwords
- Windows password
- Supervisor password
- Network password

Power-on password

You can set a power-on password to help prevent unauthorized users from starting up your ThinkPad computer.

If you set a power-on password, the password prompt appears on the screen whenever you turn on the computer. You must enter the correct password to start using the computer.

Note: If you forget your power-on password, you cannot reset it. You must take the computer to an IBM reseller or IBM marketing representative to have the password canceled.

To set a power-on password, refer to the online user's guide.

Screen saver password

You can set a screen saver password. Once the screen saver has started, only those who know the password can close the screen saver and resume operating the computer.

Note: The screen saver password does not thoroughly protect your computer against unauthorized users. By turning your computer off and then on again, an unauthorized user could restart Windows without knowing your screen saver password—unless you have also set a power-on password.

To set a screen saver password, refer to the online user's guide.

Hard-disk passwords

Two types of hard-disk passwords help protect the information on your hard disk.

When either of the hard-disk passwords has been set, the information on your hard disk cannot be accessed without one of the passwords.

These are the two types of hard-disk password:

- · User hard-disk password
- · Master hard-disk password—which requires a user password.

When a user hard-disk password is set, no one can access files and applications on the hard disk without first typing the password.

The master hard-disk password is for use by systems administrators. First set a master password that only the administrator knows. Then set a user password that can be told to the user. The user can change the user password.

The master password, like a master key, enables the administrator to access the hard disk even if the user has changed the user password.

Attention -

If you forget your hard-disk password, there is no way to reset your password or recover data from the hard disk. You must take your computer to an IBM reseller or marketing representative to replace the hard-disk drive. A fee will be charged for parts and service.

To set a hard-disk password, refer to the online user's guide.

Windows password

When you start your ThinkPad computer and Windows operating system opens, Windows will require you to enter a user ID and a password.

To set a Windows password, refer to the online user's guide.

Using password

Supervisor password

The supervisor password protects the system information stored in the IBM BIOS Setup Utility so that, without knowing the password, no one can change the configuration of the computer.

Attention -

If you forget your supervisor password, there is no way to reset it. You must take your computer to an IBM reseller or marketing representative to replace the system board. A fee will be charged for parts and service.

To establish a setup password, refer to the online user's guide.

Network password

If you work on a local area network (LAN) with your ThinkPad computer, your LAN administrator might have set passwords to restrict access to various parts of the network. If you are authorized to access restricted areas of your LAN, you will need to establish a logon password in Windows.

To establish your network password in Windows, refer to the online user's guide.

Passwords and standby mode

If you have set passwords and you put your computer into standby by pressing Fn+F4, you can resume operating the computer by pressing the Fn key.

You will be prompted to type your password. To unlock your computer, you must enter a power-on password or a supervisor password (if one is set).

If one or more hard disks has a hard-disk password, the disks are unlocked automatically when you resume your computer.

For information on hard-disk passwords with a hard disk in a docking station, refer to the online user's guide.

Using the locks and the security screw

Attaching the mechanical lock

You can attach a mechanical lock to your computer, to help prevent it from being removed without your permission.

Attach a mechanical lock to the keyhole of the computer; then secure the chain on the lock to a stationary object. Refer to the instructions shipped with the mechanical lock.

Note: You are responsible for evaluating, selecting, and implementing the locking devices and security features. IBM makes no comments, judgments, or warranties about the function, quality, or performance of locking devices and security features.

Using the security screw

The security screw shipped with your computer can help prevent the hard-disk drive from being removed.

To replace the coin screw with the security screw, do as follows:

- 1. Turn off the computer; then disconnect the ac adapter and all cables from the computer.
- 2. Remove the screw with a coin; then install the security screw, and tighten it with a 2.5-mm allen wrench.
- 3. Connect the ac adapter; then turn on the computer.

Using the Asset RF ID feature

The Asset ID RF feature, available as an option, contains Asset ID technology, which you can think of as the next generation of bar code technology. This option enables communication between the ThinkPad computer and an industry-standard radio-frequency hand-held device, called a reader hereafter in this manual. The option provides better management, deployment, and security of your ThinkPad computer inventory. After this option is installed in your computer, the reader can recognize the following information:

Serial numbers:

- · System board
- System unit

Configuration information:

- UUID
- MAC address
- CPU data
- DIMM data
- · Diskette drive data
- · IDE device data
- PCI device data
- · ISA Plug and Play device data
- LCD panel data
- Docking station data

A reader can also recognize the following user information after it has been set in your computer:

- Telephone number
- · Machine lease data

This option can also be used to prevent your computer from being stolen. It is effective only when the supervisor password is set.

If you use this option for security, you need to enable RFID security after installing it into your computer. For more information, refer to the online user's guide.

Chapter 3. Solving computer problems

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Troubleshooting

Error codes or messages

Note: In the charts, *x* can represent any character.

Message	Cause and action
0175: Bad CRC1, stop POST task	The EEPROM checksum is not correct (block # 6). Have the computer serviced.
0187: EAIA data access error	The access to EEPROM has failed. Have the computer serviced.
0188: Invalid RFID serialization information area or bad CRC2	The EEPROM checksum is not correct (block # 0 and 1, or block # 6). The system board should be replaced, and the box serial number needs to be reinstalled. Have the computer serviced.
0189: Invalid RFID configuration information area	The EEPROM checksum is not correct (blocks # 4 and 5). The system board should be replaced, and the UUID needs to be reinstalled. Have the computer serviced.
0190: Critical low-battery error	The computer turned off, because the battery is low. Connect the ac adapter to the computer and charge the battery pack, or replace the battery pack with a fully charged one.
0193: RF antenna has been removed	The RFID antenna that you installed has been removed. Enter the supervisor password to return your computer to normal operation.
0194: The computer is carried through the security gate	The computer has been carried through a security portal gate. Enter the supervisor password to return your computer to the normal operation.
0200: Hard disk error	The hard disk is not working. Make sure that the hard disk drive is attached firmly. Run the BIOS Setup Utility (refer to "Starting BIOS Setup Utility" on page 7); then make sure that the hard disk drive is not disabled in the Startup menu.

Message	Cause and action
021x: Keyboard error	Make sure that no object is placed on the keyboard or on the external keyboard, if you have one. Turn off the computer, and turn off all attached devices. Turn on the computer first; then turn on the attached devices. If you still see the same error code, do the following:
	If an external keyboard is connected, do the following:
	 Turn off the computer and disconnect the external keyboard; then turn on the computer. Make sure that your built-in keyboard operates correctly. If it does, have the external keyboard serviced. Make sure that the right connector is being used between the external keyboard and the computer.
	Test the computer by using PC-Doctor (refer to "Testing your computer" on page 30).
	If the computer stops during the test, have it serviced.
0220: Monitor type error	The monitor type does not match the type specified in CMOS. Run the IBM BIOS Setup Utility (refer to "Starting BIOS Setup Utility" on page 7) to make sure that your monitor type matches the type specified in the utility.
0230: Shadow RAM error	The shadow RAM failed. Test your computer's memory with PC-Doctor (refer to "Testing your computer" on page 30). If you added a memory module just before turning the computer on, reinstall it. Then test the memory with PC-Doctor.
0231: System RAM error	The system RAM failed. Test your computer's memory with PC-Doctor (refer to "Testing your computer" on page 30). If you added a memory module just before turning the computer on, reinstall it. Then test the memory with PC-Doctor.
0232: Extended RAM error	The extended RAM failed. Test your computer's memory with PC-Doctor (refer to "Testing your computer" on page 30). If you added memory just before turning the computer on, reinstall it. Then test the memory with PC-Doctor.
0250: System battery error	The system battery is dead. Replace the battery and run the BIOS Setup Utility (refer to "Starting BIOS Setup Utility" on page 7) to verify the configuration. If you still have a problem, have the computer serviced.
0251: System CMOS checksum bad	The system CMOS might have been corrupted by an application program. Run the BIOS Setup Utility (refer to "Starting BIOS Setup Utility" on page 7) to reconfigure the settings. If the same error code appears, have the computer serviced.
0252: Password checksum bad	The password you have set is cleared. Run the BIOS Setup Utility (refer to "Starting BIOS Setup Utility" on page 7) to set the password.
0260: System timer error	Have the computer serviced.

Message	Cause and action
0270: Real time clock error	Have the computer serviced.
0271: Date and time error	Neither the date nor the time is set in the computer. Set the date and time, using the IBM BIOS Setup Utility (refer to "Starting BIOS Setup Utility" on page 7).
0280: Previous boot incomplete	Your computer was unable to complete the boot process. Turn the computer off; then turn it on to start the IBM BIOS Setup Utility (refer to "Starting BIOS Setup Utility" on page 7). Verify the configuration and then restart the computer, either by choosing the Exit Saving Changes option under the Restart item or by pressing F10. If the same error code appears, have the computer serviced.
02D0: System cache error	The cache is disabled. Have the computer serviced.
02F4: EISA CMOS not writable	Have the computer serviced.
02F5: DMA test failed	Have the computer serviced.
02F6: Software NMI failed	Have the computer serviced.

Make sure that the startup sequence in the BIOS Setup Utility is set so that the computer starts from the device you choose.
	Make sure that the device from which the computer starts is enabled, by checking there is no ! mark preceding the device name.

Testing your computer

If you have a problem with your computer, you can test it by using PC-Doctor.

To run PC-Doctor, do as follows:

- 1. Click Start.
- 2. Move the cursor to **Programs** and then to **PC-Doctor for Windows**.
- 3. Click PC-Doctor for Windows.
- 4. Choose either the Quick Test or the standard test.

Attention

Running the Quick Test set can take 10 minutes or longer. Make sure you have time to run the entire test; do not interrupt the test while it is running.

The Quick Test set runs many test of critical hardware components, but it does not run all PC-Doctor diagnostic tests. If PC-Doctor reports that all tests have been run and that it found no problems, consider running additional tests in PC-Doctor.

If you are preparing to contact IBM for support, be sure to print the test log so that you can rapidly provide information to the help technician.

Backing up your system

Backing up your system configuration

When you add software applications or devices to your computer, the installation process can change the computer registry and configuration.

If your computer does not work properly after you add applications or devices, you need to restore the previous configuration.

Use ConfigSafe to save the configuration before you make changes. Then if something goes wrong, Use ConfigSafe to restore the system registry and configuration files.

To capture a snapshot of your system configuration with ConfigSafe:

- 1. Click Start.
- 2. Move the cursor to **Programs**, **ConfigSafe**, and then **ConfigSafe**.
- 3. Double-click ConfigSafe.
- 4. Click the camera icon.
- 5. Type a name for the snapshot. For example, before installing a word processor, you might type, "pre word processing install."
- 6. Click OK.
- 7. After a few moments, the main ConfigSafe window will return. The snapshot is complete.

If you need to restore a configuration snapshot, open ConfigSafe and follow the on-screen instructions.

Backing up your data

Hard disks are reliable data storage devices. Even so, it is wise to protect yourself against accidental data loss or the unlikely event of a hard-disk malfunction by backing up your important files regularly.

To back up data, start the backup application as follows:

- 1. Click Start.
- 2. Move the cursor to **Programs**, **Accessories**, **System Tools**, and **Backup**.
- 3. Click Backup.

Make sure that the **Create a new backup job** button is marked in the Microsoft Backup window.

Click **OK**. The Backup Wizard will guide you through backing up some or all of the files on your hard disk.

Recovering lost or damaged software

Using the Recovery CD

A Recovery CD and a Recovery Boot Diskette are provided with your computer. If the preinstalled operating system becomes damaged or is accidentally erased, you can recover it by using the Recovery CD.

Attention -

These recovery programs erase the entire hard disk, including personal files and software programs you have installed. These programs restore your hard disk to its factory-shipped condition. Be sure to back up all your personal files before you use a Recovery CD.

Note: The recovery process might take up to 2 hours.

To start the recovery process:

- 1. Turn off the computer.
- 2. Make sure that the CD- or DVD-ROM drive is connected to your computer.
- 3. Make sure that the diskette drive is connected to your computer.
- 4. Insert the Recovery CD Boot Diskette into the diskette drive.
- 5. Turn on the computer.
- 6. Follow the on-screen instructions. You will be prompted to insert the Recovery CD into the CD-ROM or DVD-ROM drive.
- 7. When you receive a message saying that the recovery process is complete, remove the Recovery CD Boot Diskette from the diskette drive.
- 8. Select **Restart**. Your computer will restart with the original preloaded operating system.

Using the Software Selections CD

The Software Selections CD is provided for your installation convenience. You can customize your computer with this CD. It contains all the software applications and device drivers for your computer.

If you need to reinstall software, or install a driver for a hardware device, put the Software Selections CD in your CD-ROM or DVD-ROM drive. The Features menu appears automatically.

The Software Selections CD offers the following functions:

Welcome

This page displays the model and serial number of your computer, and a menu from which you can select an item by clicking it.

· Install Software

Use this page for doing the following:

- Reinstalling a software application
- Installing a hardware device driver
- Installing additional software that was not preinstalled on your computer

· Uninstall Software

You can uninstall any application program or device driver that was installed from the Software Selections CD and that has an uninstall entry in the **Add/Remove Program** list.

Advanced Functions

Change Settings

You can view the Software Selections CD program text and software products in a language other than the language of your operating system.

Statement of limited warranty

The warranties provided by IBM in this Statement of Limited Warranty apply only to Machines you originally purchase for your use, and not for resale, from IBM or an IBM authorized reseller. The term "Machine" means an IBM machine, its features, conversions, upgrades, elements, or accessories, or any combination of them. Machines are subject to these terms only if purchased in the United States or Puerto Rico, or Canada, and located in the country of purchase. If you have any questions, contact IBM or your reseller.

Machine: IBM ThinkPad A20 and the Battery Pack

Warranty period*:

Model 2628: One Year

Model 2629: Three Years except in some countries

Model 2633: Three Years Battery Pack: One Year

*Elements and accessories are warranted for three months. Contact your place of purchase for warranty service information.

Production status

Each Machine is manufactured from new parts, or new and serviceable used parts (which perform like new parts). In some cases, the Machine may not be new and may have been previously installed. Regardless of the Machine's production status, IBM's warranty terms apply.

The IBM warranty

IBM warrants that each Machine 1) is free from defects in materials and workmanship and 2) conforms to IBM's Official Published Specifications. IBM calculates the expiration of the warranty period from the Machine's Date of Installation. The date on your receipt is the Date of Installation, unless IBM or your reseller informs you otherwise.

During the warranty period, IBM or your reseller will provide warranty service under the type of service designated for the Machine and will manage and install engineering changes that apply to the Machine. IBM or your reseller will specify the type of service.

For a feature, conversion, or upgrade, IBM or your reseller may require that the Machine on which it is installed be 1) the designated, serial-numbered Machine and 2) at an engineering-change level compatible with the feature, conversion, or upgrade. Some of these transactions (called "Net-Priced" transactions) may include additional parts and associated replacement parts that are provided on an exchange basis. All removed parts become the property of IBM and must be returned to IBM.

Replacement parts assume the remaining warranty of the parts they replace.

If a Machine does not function as warranted during the warranty period, IBM or your reseller will repair or replace it (with a Machine that is at least functionally equivalent) without charge. If IBM or your reseller is unable to do so, you may return it to your place of purchase and your money will be refunded.
